Invasive Alien Species Observatory and Network Development for the Assessment of Climate Change Impacts and Contextual Ecosystem Services Evaluation in Black Sea Deltaic Protected Areas

Overview

The Black Sea bioregion faces pressure from non-native species, maritime transport, climate change, and economic development. The project aims to address the impact of Invasive Alien Species (IAS) on Ecosystem Services (ES) by enhancing the management and mitigation of IAS, reducing its spread, improving ecosystem resilience, and ensuring sustainable ES provision in the deltaic regions.



Road Ahead

- Common Invasive Alien Species (IAS) and Ecosystem Services (ES) monitoring and evaluation protocols for climate change adaptation
- Capacity building on Natura 2000 mapping in the non-EU project's nature protected areas for balanced ecosystem
- Invasive Alien Species and Ecosystem Services Observatory to allow cross-border networking, communication and research activities
- Living Lab activity with students through field visits, workshops, and practical exercises, collaborating with researchers for increasing awareness amongst youth
- Bio-Rooms concept (a museum type gallery of the regional biodiversity) in each partner country to raise ecological awareness among the general public especially youth
